A look back at the past year and ahead to summer

Youth programming grows each year. In-school programs have enriched classroom science lessons and provided field trips to the Greenberg Reserve. After-school nature programs have been offered at three elementary schools, fall, winter and spring. Home-schoolers have come to the Center for our Natural Science Toolkits. We count a total of 628 students served directly, a 200% increase from the previous year.

Our five “Valley We Live In” winter lectures drew a total of 225 citizens out on winter Thursday evenings. Our thanks to the speakers who donated their time and to the Bank of Bennington for its sponsorship. Our Director, Holly Betit, has added a new monthly series, “Third Thursdays,” informational presentations by local speakers on varied topics. The programs have served about 25 per Thursday and will continue through the summer.



Summer camps, Camp Mentor and Me and Camp Connect, will provide positive mentorship and an outdoor day camp experience for youth who will benefit from a supportive environment that helps them connect with the natural world through exploration, with support for overcoming barriers. A grant from the Agnes Lindsay Trust will provide assistance for campers who do not have local sponsorship. Our Center and Greenberg Reserve will also host field trips from other local day camp and summer programs.

Natural Science Toolkit For Home Schoolers

The final session of our Natural Science Toolkit (May 4) focused on Wetland Wonders. The session began at the center with information about life cycles, characteristics and adaptations of animals to a wetland habitat. Frogs, salamanders and turtles were the focus. Then all put on boots and grabbed pails to explore the ecology of Jewett Brook and the pond just below the bridge.

The Home School classes are led by Mary Batcheller, well-known in this area for her knowledge and leadership of birding.

Nature Exploration Kits!

We want to make an impact on our local environmental education. Thanks to funding from a private grant, we have developed six amazing Nature Exploration Kits for anyone to rent, explore, learn and enjoy. They were created with non-formal groups (homeschoolers, 4H, Scouts, etc.) in mind, but any family or group can rent one out for a 3-week time period.

Kit topics include birds, insects, bats, trees, mammals, and reptiles and amphibians. We call them “Kits,” but they are really trunks, filled with a lot of awesome “stuff” (the type of things that make us nature educators salivate) like specimens, skeletons, neat posters, books, stuffed animals, games, etc.. Each kit also includes 8-10 activities that are adaptable to a wide range of ages, abilities, and group sizes.

We needed nearly a year of work to put them together. Now we look forward to getting the word out and seeing the community response. For more information, go to our website, www.oneworldconservationcenter.org.



Nymphfest at the One World Conservation Center

Biologists, entomologists and interested citizens from New England, plus a few from as far as Wisconsin, convened at the OWCC on a May weekend to share their knowledge of dragonflies. Nymphfest, sponsored by the Dragonfly Association of the Americas with support from the Vermont Center for Ecostudies and organized by Kevin Hemeon of Hoosick Falls. The event is an opportunity for professionals, members of the Association and the general public to learn more about identifying dragonflies. The 40+ attendees listened to lectures on dragonfly collection and identification, then put their knowledge to use in the afternoon by identifying insects from the “skins” (exuviae) shed when the insects molt into adults. Ken Tennesen, currently writing a key to the North American genera of dragonflies and damselflies, and other biologists were on hand to help out. Sunday featured lectures on specific genera (groups) of dragonflies, again followed by more identification.
